Amongst the many iconic blues masters that I met and learned from directly was KC Douglas b. 11/21/13, Sharon, MS - d. 10/18/75, Berkeley, CA - Douglas moved to Vallejo, California in 1945 to work in the naval shipyards, and by 1947 was playing on the San Francisco/Oakland blues scene. Douglas was influenced by Tommy Johnson, whom he had worked with in the Jackson, Mississippi area in the early 1940s. I met KC in 1969 in Berkeley, CA. He worked for the City of Berkeley Streets Dept. driving a truck, and he played music in local clubs and at music festivals. KC, as a result of his working with Tommy Johnson in the Jackson, MS area in the early 1940s, could play/duplicate most all of Tommy Johnson's music better than anyone I've heard. I 'dogged'/followed him around at his gigs and visited him at his home. He was kind enough to show how to play a number of Tommy Johnson's tunes. One of the most popular and most accessible of those tunes is the great country blues classic "Big Road Blues." Here's my transcription of "Big Road Blues," as played by KC Douglas, which he learned directly from Tommy Johnson:
